Of Mice & Men (and their RC Aircraft)- Steve Warmath

I would guess that most of us have more than one RC plane or helicopter. If you have more than one (even many), storage can be an issue. You may have some ready to fly planes (readily accessible) and those that didn't quite make it to completion. Then there are those you haven't flow in a while that end up sitting on the shelf or hanging from the ceiling until you manage to get around to putting them into service (long term storage). That would be me. Some of my planes are stored in my office while others in my garage on shelving. To ease my storage situation, I decided to thin the herd this year to make room for newer models. I'm going

To ease my storage situation, I decided to thin the herd this year to make room for newer models. I'm going through all my "stuff" in preparation for hauling it off to the Perry show this year. At this point, you may be wondering what this has to do with mice.

Well, about a year ago, I discovered we had a mouse problem in our garage. I first noted they were getting into

food stuff on shelves and later discovered they were getting into other things as well. I found shredded paper and droppings in a few places and at the behest of my very understanding wife, I began to track them down and get rid of them, which I did.



Sitting high above the floor on a top shelf in the garage was, what appeared to be, my pristine E-Flite Stearman. I decided this would be a good candidate for Perry. I had installed the radio equipment, servos and had a LiPo battery in it but had never flown it. As I started to dust it off and clean it up, I noticed a few little things about the monocote covering. The blue fuselage covering had some clear areas where the color had separated from the film. There were also what appeared to be "chew" marks on exposed stringers along the bottom. OK. So far not so bad. I can fix that. It gets worse. Along the left side of the fuselage, the film was separating and exposed structural damage to the wood substructure below. Uh oh. I removed the upper battery and radio compartment hatch to discover there was substantial internal damage on the left side. The radio system and the main wood structure were shredded. There is a fairly large ESC air vent opening on the bottom of the fuselage. A mouse was able to squeeze into the plane and do significant damage from within.

The wires from the servos to the receiver and other internal wiring were chewed up. Even the balance plug wiring to the battery was chewed off. There were also chew marks on the battery as well. Lucky for the mouse, it didn't get fried or worse cause a fire. I checked around and could not find a replacement for the fuselage which was really the only damage. The rest of the model is in great shape. For now, I guess it will go back on the shelf until I decide what to do with it. It would take a good bit of work to fix the damage done. It probably would not have fit in my car anyway with all the other stuff I'm taking. I'm happy to report we presently have no mice but the damage has been done. Check your stash. Mice will apparently eat anything.
