

It's Time to "Believe in a Cure"

The Seminole Radio Control Club has a long history of giving to our community. We hold one special event each fall to benefit a charity close to our members' hearts and our community. This event is *Believe in a Cure* and will be held on Sunday, October 7.

Member and friends participation in this event is more important this year than ever. In recent years, the club voted to supplement *Believe in a Cure* day revenue with money from our club treasury for our charity donation. This year, we voted to not supplement event revenue from our club treasury due to limited club revenue and increasing costs. So, it is important that the event produce substantial revenue this year.

The event promises to be a day of fun, flying, food and fellowship and it is all for charity. Some very nice merchandise will be raffled. Plan to attend and fly whatever you want. The event is open to the public. Invite your friends and neighbors. We expect some out of town pilot participation due to outreach to other clubs by Theo Titus.

Members are welcome to bring RC items for sale to the event. Members should donate 10% of sale proceeds (\$15 maximum) to the charity for personal items sold.

There will be a \$10.00 pilot fee. Because this is a charity event, all pilots who participate are expected to pay the fee even if they do not fly. Also, this is an AMA sanctioned event. So, all pilots must show their AMA cards.

Food will be available starting at 11:30 AM for \$5.00. All fee, food and raffle proceeds will go to the Shands Children's Miracle Network (CMN) as agreed by our membership.

Children's Miracle Network Hospitals® raise funds for 170 children's hospitals across North America, which, in turn, use the money where it is needed most. When a donation is given, it stays in the community ensuring every dollar helps local kids.



Many of our members enjoyed these events both as participants and spectators. The general feeling is that we should continue these types of events in the future.
